He was looking for work and was prepared to work for a R2. I had a look at and immediately was full with compassion.

I gave him a meal to eat and we chatted about his life. He has been in and out of rehab and is really trying to keep clean. He told me that his father does not want to acknowledge he is his son. I could see the pain in his eyes. All he really wants is to be acknowledged by his father.

What was really sad for me was how he valued himself. He was prepared to work for just R2!

This is a typical example of our kids when they fall by the wayside and end up believing that they are insignificant. I can say with all honesty that GCU gives a glimmer of hope to these kinds of boys.
